## Bill 1

## Responsible Reporting Act

WHEREAS 60 percent of Canadians report following news and current affairs daily; and

WHEREAS "journalism needs to keep its head, maintain an independent mind and pay attention to the basics of accuracy, fairness and attention to detail";<sup>2</sup> and

**WHEREAS** the National NewsMedia Council, an agency that adjudicates complaints about Canadian press, does not consider news broadcasts on television or radio;<sup>3</sup>

## THEREFORE HER MAJESTY, BY AND WITH THE ADVICE AND CONSENT OF THE YOUTH PARLIAMENT OF MANITOBA, ENACTS AS FOLLOWS:

- 1 As of January 1, 2018, the Government of Canada shall create the Bureau of Regulating the Operation And Diction of Canadian Articles, Stories & Telecommunications [BROADCAST] to establish a reporting standard for all Canadian news outlets.
  - (1) **BROADCAST** shall review the print, web, television, and radio media of outlets with a weekly cumulative audience of over 500,000.
    - (a) If there are no outlets in a capital city that meet the above rate in any category, the outlet with the largest weekly cumulative audience shall be reviewed.
  - (2) **BROADCAST** shall be comprised of non-partisan linguists, journalists, and professionals in the following fields:
    - (a) Arts and culture;
    - (b) Business and economics;
    - (c) Politics;
    - (d) Science.
  - (3) Candidates shall be selected by a board consisting of one representative from each outlet under the jurisdiction of **BROADCAST**, and one non-voting member from the Canadian Radio-television and Telecommunications Commission who shall act as a chair.

- **2 BROADCAST** shall conduct reviews with adherence to existing policies and style guides, but in the event of ambiguity, shall take precedence.
  - (1) **BROADCAST** shall review news media for the following:
    - (a) Factual and statistical accuracy;
    - (b) Discriminatory vocabulary, as determined by **BROADCAST**;
    - (c) Funding by partisan sources, and prohibiting thereof.
  - (2) Reviews shall only be initiated following a submitted complaint.
- 3 Outlets that do not violate the criteria in 2(1), at the discretion of **BROADCAST**, shall be eligible for benefits provided by the Canadian government.
  - (1) Outlets that do not commit any violations for a period of 18 months shall be granted the following benefits:
    - (a) Priority media access to buildings owned by municipal, provincial, and national governments in Canada;
    - (b) Recognition on the Government of Canada website;
    - (c) Grants to be used for stationing employees, establishing new platforms, or subsidizing publication and distribution costs.
- 4 On the instance of a violation, the offending outlet shall be required to issue a statement of regret through the original medium by which the violation was committed.
  - (1) The statement must be issued by or on the fifth day following the original reporting date.
    - (a) In the case of 2(1)(c), outlets shall be required to revoke the funding immediately.
  - (2) If an outlet issues a statement within this period, the violation shall be pardoned.
  - (3) If an outlet fails to issue a statement within this period, it shall lose the following:
    - (a) Any benefits, if accrued;
    - (b) The right to reporting for a period of four months following the original violation date.
