

#### **Alumni Spotlight:** Tom Axworthy





I am happy to share our next alumni spotlight, highlighting a very notable alumnus who is also a mentor in the Alumni Mentorship Program this year!

In 1964, Thomas (Tom) Axworthy 's YPM journey began with his successful election to the post of Deputy Minister of External Affairs for the 43<sup>rd</sup> Session. Subsequently, he served as YPM's Minister of External Affairs in the 44<sup>th</sup> Session and the Minister of Canadian Affairs in the 45<sup>th</sup> Session. In the 46<sup>th</sup> Session, Tom was elected as an executive member of YPM, and served as the Deputy Premier. Tom continued to lead YPM as the Premier of the 47<sup>th</sup> Session, and the Speaker of the 48<sup>th</sup> Session in 1969.

Tom attended United College (now the University of Winnipeg). After graduating with a bachelor of arts with honors in history and politics, he began graduate school at Queen's University, where he graduated with a master of arts degree in 1972 and a doctoral degree in 1979. After years of work in the Canadian political world, Tom returned to academia at Harvard University. In 1984, Tom was invited to be a Fellow at the Institute of Politics at the John F. Kennedy School of Government and the Centre of International Affairs (Canadian program). During this time, Tom also taught comparative politics at Harvard's Kennedy School of Government. In 2003,he returned to his alma mater, Queen's University. Tom worked as the Chair and Executive Director of the Centre for the Study of Democracy, where he oversaw the publication of several studies on improving Canadian political institutions, and how Canada could advance democracy abroad.

Tom's work in the Canadian political world began around the same time as his YPM career. In 1958, he was a young Liberal volunteer in that year's Canadian federal election for Winnipeg local ridings. He continued this role in subsequent elections until 1968, the same year that he served as YPM's Premier. In 1967, Tom went to Ottawa where he worked in the Pearson government as a research assistant for the Task Force on the Structure of the Canadian Economy which reported to the Hon.Walter Gordon, the President of the Privy Council. This valuable work experience informed his values and allowed him to establish life-long connections with his colleagues. After graduating from Queen's University with a PhD, Tom soon began working in Ottawa, taking on various roles, such as political strategist and policy advisor to Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau, eventually becoming Chief of Staff to Mr. Trudeau and head of the Prime Ministers Office in 1981-1984. In this position he worked on repatriation of the Constitution and the adoption of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms.

Tom also devoted much of his professional life to work in foundations. During his time at Harvard University, Tom also served as head of the Charles R. Bronfman Foundation, where he contributed to the creation of the "Heritage Minutes" series of short videos, displaying various aspects of Canadian history in a digestible format. In 1999, Tom helped create the Historica Foundation, and became its executive director. The Historica Foundation aimed to improve the teaching and learning of Canadian history, and established the Heritage Fair Program, allowing hundreds of thousands of students to display their own heritage project annually. In 2009, Tom became the president and CEO of the Walter and Duncan Gordon Foundation, created by Walter Gordon, his first boss in Ottawa. During his tenure, the Gordon Foundation focused on Canada's North and freshwater preservation, and eventually assisted in the creation of the Canada Water Agency.

After spending most of his professional life away from his childhood home, Tom retired to Winnipeg recently to be closer to his grandchildren. However, he continues to make important contributions to the world through his work in academia, currently serves the Public Policy Chair of Massey College at the University of Toronto. Reflecting on his YPM time, Tom stated that he learned how to formulate thoughtful speeches on his feet by participating in debate in the chamber, which he had to often exercise in his professional career. The unique experience of working in a legislative building was also magical to Tom as a youth, and a sight that he did not

witness until his own professional work on Parliament Hill. As an alumnus mentor of YPM103, Tom is very happy to see that the legacy of YPM has continued to make impacts on the world, and benefit the youth of Canada.

But enough about me, let's dive into the first official cabinet meeting of YPM103!


